Regional Funders Commit More Than \$1.6 M

The Highland Street Foundation, along with other leading philanthropic organizations, have come together to strengthen the support network for people in distress by committing more than \$1.6 million to address the urgent needs of people affected by the economic crisis in Massachusetts.

Taking part in the collaborative effort are the Boston Foundation, Combined Jewish Philanthropies, Eos Foundation, the Highland Street Foundation, the Linde Family Foundation, United Way of Massachusetts Bay and Merrimack Valley, and a family that asked to remain anonymous.

The Highland Street Foundation's grants were directed to the following organizations.

- **Heading Home**: Funding for housing and support services
- **HEARTH**: Funding for homelessness prevention among the elderly
- **Lawrence Community Works**: Funding for struggling families to build assets and escape poverty
- **Mass Housing & Shelter Alliance**: Funding for Home & Healthy for Good, a state-wide initiative to cut healthcare costs for the chronically homeless
- **YWCA of Southeastern Massachusetts**: Funding for temporary housing

"Youth Philanthropy Initiative"

The Highland Street Youth Philanthropy Initiative seeks to engage and empower youth to collectively choose and fund nonprofit organizations that are addressing the most pressing community and societal needs. By partnering with a select number of schools and organizations to pilot this project, HSF helps youth develop the knowledge, insight and teamwork skills necessary to collaborate and make decisions regarding fund allocation to nonprofit organizations.

Students learn about community needs and nonprofit organizations, then evaluate nonprofits in their own communities by making site visits to various organizations, presenting their findings to one another, and collectively deciding how to distribute up to \$10,000 in funding.

City Year Highland Street Team

The Corps members of the Highland Street Foundation Team serving at the Maurice J. Tobin School in Roxbury are looking forward to a life-changing year. The team is comprised of ten motivated young adults ages 19 to 25 whose main goal for the year is to ensure the success of the Tobin scholars through creating a positive school environment, providing excellent afterschool programming, and providing academic support in classrooms, focusing on both literacy and math. During the school day, the corps members provide classroom support and lunchtime mentoring programs with the goal of getting struggling students back on track. When school lets out, the team runs City Year's signature afterschool program called Starfish Corps for students in grades 3-5. The program provides homework help, followed by a variety of different enriching activities designed by corps members that focus on community building and promote civic engagement.
